



ACTIVITY 1 - TOM'S STORY

EXTENSION ACTIVITIES - PUT YOUR LEARNING INTO PRACTISE

OPTION 1 — BEYOND THE IMMEDIATE IMPACT

In pairs or small groups, think of your own scenarios of dangerous behaviour that could happen around the railway, level crossings or overhead line equipment and the impact this could have.

Remember to think beyond the immediate impact a situation could have on an individual and consider;

- Who else is involved in the situation?
- How may they be affected?
- What could be the short and long-term impacts of the behavior you have chosen?

OPTION 2 - PARALLEL LINES

Visit our existing resource, <u>'Consequences: Switched On for split second decisions'</u> and watch the 'Parallel lines film'

Now you have watched the Parallel lines film, it's time to create an impact map of your choice of three characters. You might want to choose characters that have different experiences from each other and therefore feel a different sense of impact on their day to day life and future.

You might want to consider the state of their mental, educational and financial health. What about their relationships with friends and family? Will the accident impact their trust levels or even their confidence?
